In January this year I was contacted by Sarah Preston who works as a tutor at the East Riding College in Beverley. This College provides education for young

adults with learning difficulties. She had seen the Bega Kwa Bega poster in our GP surgery and invited me to speak to her students about my experiences in Uganda. Of course I was delighted to have such a great opportunity to raise the awareness about Bega Kwa Bega.

The students were involved in a business studies project which involved setting up and running a small business within the college for a term. All profits made from their efforts would then be donated to a charity.

The talk generated much interest and discussion and the students were very keen to get involved as part of their learning project for the term.

In July, I was invited back to the college where I was given a presentation by the students, of their achieved course work. This included visual aids and a very funny animated power point presentation of their term's work.

Their 'business' included selling Valentine's Day items and an Easter Tombola. They also researched Uganda's orphans and the poverty found there.

At the end of the session I was very honoured to receive a cheque from the profit they made, for £230, and thanked them so much on behalf of everyone at Bega Kwa Bega.

I am looking forward to returning to Uganda in October to help with the Mobile Clinic. The provisional dates at present are 25^{th} October - 5^{th} November 2011.

On Wed 9th November 2011 I have been asked to speak about Bega Kwa Bega to a group in Beverley called 'Hull Bridge Wives' at their fund raising evening. This again was because of the Bega Kwa Bega awareness posters displayed in our surgery waiting room and pharmacy.

Annual Supper

On Friday 13th May the seventh annual supper took place at the Christian Centre behind St. Anne's Church in Wendover to raise funds for Bega Kwa Bega. This supper has in the past been a very successful event and this year was no exception. Volunteers from the Wendover community came together and served a three course meal to the fifty four people that attended and raised £1043. A huge thank you goes to Mike Spain who, true to form, produced a wonderful meal and to all the volunteers (too many to mention) who gave up their time to make the supper such a success.

A power point presentation was given by Hannah Bysouth, a student nurse in her final year at Kings College London. Hannah visited Uganda for two weeks in August last year together with another nurse, Sister Janice Shaw. They were welcomed by the Manager of Bega kwa Bega and both attended a number of clinics and had first hand experience of the tremendous struggle people have to access medical services. Below is a brief extract from Hannah's presentation.

The BKB clinic is free and open to anyone who requires medical assistance, regardless of status, class, gender, age or religion, £10,000 per year provides medications for 3 weekly out-reach clinics over a year, although as the number of attendees is always rising, there is often not enough medication to go round. There are any number attending clinics. Of the clinics we saw there were between 200 and 400 attending each session. These outreach clinics are often the only medical attention villagers receive. Some attendees travel miles to reach the clinic which may visit only every few weeks in their district. Due to funding, there is a limit as to how often the Mobile Clinic can operate. On many visits some patients will be turned away as the amount of medicine which can be bought is insufficient to meet demands.

Anna Parmiter in Uganda Part 1

I visited Uganda during the first three weeks of July 2011. My niece, Minnie Parmiter, accompanied me and we were joined by two friends of hers, Hannah Murphy and Andrew Edwards. Minnie, a scientist specialising in malaria, worked with the mobile clinic and gave them helpful advice and information. Hannah and Andrew, a geography teacher, came with me to the schools. I am hoping all three will want to continue to support BkB. Minnie is hoping to bring the mobile clinic into her Phd which starts in September. She hopes to visit the clinic again.

I worked during the first week in Bugabo Lakeside School and during the second week in St Jude's School and Aston School, all in the Kisubi area. Previously I had worked in teacher training but this time I worked in the schools, either teaching English myself or working with the English teachers giving help and advice. I felt this would be my last visit in the field, due to age and a bad back, and I felt that by being in a school I would get an idea of how best to help in the future.

I felt in all the schools that the nursery classes needed attention. The classrooms were very overcrowded and the children only had one bench so that when they had to write they had to kneel on the ground and use the bench as a desk. I mentioned this to the heads. Another worry was in Aston School where the head had to admit the teachers of the first three classes were not trained and the 'Baby Class' (nursery) was in chaos. The noise from this class disturbed many other classes. The teacher in St Jude's was excellent. I brought with me toys, puppets and books and made suggestions as to how these could be used for language work. I also stressed that they would learn quicker if learning was fun.

WILL YOU SPONSOR A CHILD?

For just £5 a month you could SUPPORT a child through education. Nursery provision is where children will learn English. There is no provision for state nursery schools in Uganda. Children need to learn English to enable them to enter the state primary schools. Some children receive sponsorship so that they can attend nursery and thereby go on to attend primary and senior state schools. Often their sponsors will continue to support them throughout their schooling and this helps to provide children with lunch, uniforms and equipment they need.

Sponsoring a child enables them to have an education which equips them with essential skills needed to encourage independence and the ability to go on to support themselves and eventually their own families.
